### **Judge Information Sheet**

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#### **Preparation Required:**

- Have realistic expectations. While first and second-year law students possess foundational legal knowledge, they may require guidance and mentorship as they learn to work with court documents and draft legal materials.
- Advance Communications
  - o Confirm internship start and end dates
  - o Finalize intern's work schedule (days/hours)
  - o If possible:
    - Provide information about the projects the intern will be working on in advance. Sharing relevant preparatory materials may also be beneficial.
    - Assign recommended readings
- Arrange for any accessibility/disability accommodations requested by the student
- Identify and secure necessary equipment and workspace for the interns use
- Prepare local orientation materials for the intern, which may include:
  - Local maps and map of the courthouse
  - o Parking information and any relevant parking permits
  - o Information from the Chamber of Commerce/Visitor Bureau on community events
  - o Information on county or judge specific document formats and procedures

#### **Upon Intern Arrival:**

- Provide orientation materials
- Arrange courthouse and staff tour/orientation

**During Internship**: Please meet regularly with your intern to discuss work assignments/issues.

- Observing/Attending:
  - Jury selection (Criminal/Civil)
  - Initial appearances
  - Closing arguments (Criminal/Civil)
  - o Restraining order hearing
  - Mental commitment hearing
  - Other court proceedings that expose students to methods of direct and cross examination, judicial-jury-witness response, and effective trial advocacy techniques
